





























 Chuckie's Mormon Cousin 




 There are times when a teacher has to adjust and adapt. Think of a  class with a kid like Chuckie. His cousin lives in Colorado and is  Mormon. Chuckie is growing in his walk with the LORD and has a  definite passion that his cousin come to faith in Christ. He often  prays for his friends and relatives. One week he announces that his  cousin's family is coming east for a vacation and he wants the kids in  the class to pray that his cousin will be allowed to attend church and  Sunday school with him.

 A couple weeks later Chuckie comes into class unannounced with a  new kid. He makes sure that everybody gets to meet his cousin.

 This is the moment when a teacher has to adjust. No matter what he  has prepared for the lesson already, this morning the class time must  include a very clear explanation of salvation.

 I always cover these 7 points. 

-  • We've all sinned. 
-  • God is holy. 
-  • Sin must be punished. 
-  • Good works don't work to take away sin. 
-  • Jesus is God and died to pay for sin. 
-  • We must believe Jesus died for bad people (us), not for good  people (there are none)
-  • Faith, not works, gives us eternal life. 

 If a teacher is not faithful in explaining salvation in moments like  Chuckie's cousin, he/she simply is not faithful, and God takes note of  that.
