- * Paul witnessed to Nero face to face 64 AD [?]
- * Myth of Peter's presence in Rome started in 3rd century
- * Strong church existed in Rome but finally collapsed into ritualism
- * Roman Catholic Church blossomed when Constantine made Christianity the official state religion [312 AD]

8Keys NON-BIBLICAL ROMAN HISTORY

- * Church in Rome may have been started by Diaspora [*the dispersion*] saints who were scattered [*Acts 8.1*] in obedience to Acts 1.8. everybody left town except the apostles.

- * population of Corinth, 400,000
- * "Seaman's Paradise, Drunkard's Heaven, Virtuous Woman's Hell" popular ditty
- * Corinthian columns exceptionally ornate
- * city-state status in Roman Empire, tax-free
- * very rich from transit trade at isthmus, 50 mi SW of Athens
- * Isthmian games 1st & 3rd years, in Corinth
- * Olympic games 4th years, continuously for 776 BC—393 AD [*nearly 12 centuries uninterrupted*]
north of Athens, at Mt. Olympus
- * Epicurean motto: "eat, drink for tomorrow we die"
- * 2.6-11 alludes to esoteric religions

- * Paul admits circumcision is wrong for Jews, 5.11
- * book similar theme to Romans

8. People mentioned by name

apostle co-workers only: James, Peter, John, Barnabas, Titus [Paul's backup squad]

The fact that mentions of Barnabas is indication that Paul wrote this very shortly after their joint trip to Galatia, before they split up.

It was before Paul took his 2nd tour through Galatia starting in Acts 16.

Most commentators ignore this fact and many attribute the writing of Galatians to 15 years later.

9. Of special note

- * Martin Luther said of Galatians, "I am married to it."
- * Church had grown very large, Gentile base, Jewish influence, believing Judaizer heretics from Jerusalem [or Israel],
 1st Church Council—50 AD - Acts 15
- * book written before or immediately after Council
- * destruction of the Temple severed all Jew/Church relationships, circumcision never an issue again
- * written from Antioch after 1st trip, Acts 14,28, "they abode long time with the disciples."

- * "Omnis Gallia est divisa en tres partes," first line of Julius Caesar's book, Gallic Wars, 58-52 BC
- * central Turkey, orig home of Hittites
- * Gauls, Celts from France, settled in Turkey
- * homeland of Timothy
- * no famous churches
- * site of Paul & Barnabas' first missionary tour, planting churches in Cyprus [?], Perga, Pisidia, Lystra, Derbe
By the by, I believe God loves church planters [*elders who are sent*] better than any other kind of missionaries.
- * 2nd & 3rd tours also went through Galatia.
- * Timothy joined the team on 2nd tour at Lystra, a seasoned worker, not a brand new Christian as some lamely assume.



* *Church planting ministry cut short by 2 years while waiting in Caesarean jail. God had already promised Paul he would stand before kings. Acts 9.15 [by Ananias].*
- Taking vow to prove “thou keepest the Law,” Acts 21.24

T. Paul as a writer

- He cries, prays, hugs, encourages, peels hide, rebukes, corrects [*sometimes all in the same epistle, I Cor*]
- He feels: abandoned, overwhelmed by their apostasy, encouraged by their growth and faithfulness, wounded by their questioning his authority, hurt by cutting remarks, like a harried substitute School teacher, as well as ecstatic about their growth.

Timeline of the apostle Paul

Paul's Biosketch:

- ⇒ “a man of small stature, with a bald head and crooked legs, in a good state of body, with eyebrows meeting [*unibrow*] and nose somewhat hooked.”
- Onesiphorus of Iconium, *Acts of Paul and Thecla [contemporary who met Paul]*
- ⇒ “his bodily presence is weak and his speech contemptible.” *II Cor 10.10*
- ⇒ not the first missionary, Barnabas had already been sent out by the Jerusalem church as a church planter to Antioch *Acts 11.22* [8Keys](#), #3, COMPARE
- ⇒ recruited [*from Tarsus*] by Barnabas to come to Antioch [*150 miles west of Antioch*] *Acts 11.25*
- ⇒ Missionary [*Doc's definition*] = “an elder who is sent out by his church to go plant churches Cross culturally.” *pjm*
- * no promise of financial support
- * preach the Word of God without charge, *I Cor 9.18*
- * 3 missionary journeys, 15 years [*AD 44-58*]: 7,000 miles
[half by boat, most by commercial airlines or on foot],
- ⇒ apostle = “someone sent [*on a mission*]”

An apostle is . . .

"Tentmaker" = *[definition today] a missionary who supports himself with part-time employment*

a. II Thes 3.8 made tents in Thessalonika AD 52

Paul starts *[Acts 18.3]* then quits tentmaking two verses later *[18.5]*.

Phil 4.14-19 obviously Paul was in Thessalonika more than "Three Sabbaths" The church at Philippi sent Paul relief money at least

twice while Paul was living and church planting in Thessalonika.

*If Paul started out with a next egg *[pjm, opinion]* it had run out by his second missionary tour.*

b. I Cor 11.7 "preached. . .freely" (NAS "without charge") in Corinth, AD 54.

Later apologizes to the Corinthians *[53 AD]* for not giving them an opportunity to support him. He tells them he treated them as "inferior to other churches. . .not burdensome to you . . .forgive me this wrong"

Follow these 8 principles, [Bible study methods: hermeneutics = rules of engagement].

- The Law of **Non-contradiction**, no verse contradicts any other verse. **Numeros Uno!**
- The Law of **Context**, no verse is properly understood apart from the paragraph and chapter in which it is found.
- The Law of **Comparing Scripture with other Scripture**.
- The Law of basic **Literal, Historical, Grammatical** understanding.
 - * assume all verses are to be understood literally, unless in a figure of speech or the context is poetry
 - * consider the time period: before the period of Moses, during the life of Christ, during the Church age, yet future.
 - * grammar, sentence structure, and vocabulary are to be seen in a common sense.
- The Law that there is **Only One Interpretation for Any Verse**. It is the meaning God had in mind when He wrote that verse.
- The **Same Author** Law. When perplexed we might have to find out how the same author used a puzzling phrase or word in another place. For instance the sounding of the “trumpet” from heaven occurs at three different times for Matthew and John and Paul.
- The Law that **Clear Verses Explain Unclear Verses**. We may have to hunt all through the Bible for the clearest verse to shed light on some fuzzier verses.
- **T.B.D.S.**, sometimes **The Bible Doesn't Say** what you'd like to know. God doesn't always answer all of our questions right there in the paragraph. We might have to do some digging. Sometimes the Bible doesn't answer what we'd like to know at all.

○ **11. Pax Romana, *The Peace of Rome*, instigated by Caesar Augustus?**

27 AD—180 AD, 200 years



- Peacefulness all over the empire from England to Morocco to Iraq, and even extended to Persia [*Iran*] and north Africa. A few skirmishes but nothing major.
- Unprecedented prosperity. Greece too, had its Golden Age of Pericles, 450 BC.
- Stable republican government
- Hegemonic power [*the stronger party rules the nation*]
- Significant expansion east and west
- Significant building projects, Colosseum, roads, [*all roads lead to Rome*], aqueducts, Hadrian's wall
- Latin is the lingua franca [*gov't, military*]
- Greek language rules education, philosophy, & commerce.
- Rome allowed conquered people citizenship if they served in military
- Most slaves were white, many were conquered people, treated as humans not chattel this policy was instituted by Alex in 300s BC. It created high level of loyalty to the Greek empire and later to the Roman empire.
- Freedom for trade unions and guilds
- Allegiance to Rome was demanded. It culminated in homage to Caesar as “*divi filius*” [*son of the gods*].

○ **12. Paul's M.O. in Acts**

- Visit the synagogue because they had the inspired Hebrew Bible.
- Usually stayed to answer questions and engage in discussion.
- If opposition arose he moved out of the synagogue to receptive location.
- When a church was grounded in NT theology move on leaving Jews knowledgeable in the OT Scriptures to teach about the Messiah and the new Church. Sometimes returning to appoint elders.

New Nature & Old Nature

Philip J. Myers

*The New Nature Cannot Sin - The Old Nature Can Do No Righteous Deeds
I John 3.9*

Our Old Nature will be destroyed at the Rapture and so in heaven we will never sin again.
Without a brand new "nature" we would sin in eternity.
"We shall be like Him." I John 3.2

This doctrine is described in nine New Testament books:

"born again of . . .the Spirit" [John 3.5]
 "born of the flesh" [John 3.6]
 "the natural man/spiritual man"
 "the body of sin" [Rom 6.6]
 "dead unto sin / alive unto God" [Rom 6.11]
 "servants of sin / servants of righteousness" [Rom 6.17,18]
 "the inward man" [Rom 7.22 5-25]
 "the sinful nature" [Rom 13.14]
 "The natural man receiveth not the things of the Spirit of God." [I Cor 2.14]
 "the mind of Christ" [I Cor 2.16]
 "new creation" [II Cor 5.17]
 "the flesh and the spirit" [Gal 5.17]
 "the inner man" [Eph 3.16]
 "new / old man" [Col 3.10]
 "partakers of the divine nature" [I Pet 1.4]
 "whosoever abideth in Him / whosoever sinneth" [I John 3.4-6]
 "abides . . .cannot sin" [I John 3.9]

- We believe the Bible teaches that a true child of God has two births:
 - one of the flesh [*water, human, John 3*]
 - one of the Spirit: born again, regenerated, sons of God, heirs of salvation [*Spirit, John 3*]
- The flesh nature is neither good nor holy, though one unbeliever might do less sins than another.
- The spiritual Nature [*new man, Col 3.10*] does not, can not, commit sin.
[I John 3.9 KJV, Rom 7.19]
"commit" = poieo, Gr [poieo] it does not mean practice, it means do, enact, perform, act
The NIV & other versions erroneously translate the word poieo [ποιεω] as "practice sin" [example: I John 3.9]. The word for practice is prasso [πρασσω], which is easily seen as the etymological root of "practice."
- Having both new and old natures results in warfare between the spirit and the flesh, which continues until physical death, or the return of the Lord. [*Rom 7*]
- The new birth cannot change in any way the flesh nature of man, but the flesh nature can be controlled and kept subdued by the new man.
- All claims of the eradication of the old nature in this life are unscriptural.

KEY PASSAGE

Rom 7:15-25 That which I do I allow not: for what I would, that do I not; but what I hate, that do I. 16 If then I do that which I would not, I consent unto the law that it is good. 17 Now then it is no more I that do it, but sin [nature] that dwelleth in me. 18 For I know that in me (that is, in my flesh), dwelleth no good thing: for to will is present with me; but how to perform that which is good I find not. 19 For the good that I would I do not: but the evil which I would not, that I do. 20 Now if I do that I would not, it is no more I that do it, but sin that dwelleth in me. 21 I find then a law, that, when I would do good, evil is present with me. 22 For I delight in the law of God after the inward man, 23 but I see another law in my members, warring against the law of my mind, and bringing me into captivity to the law of sin which is in my members. 24 O wretched man that I am! who shall deliver me from the body of this death? 25 I thank God through Jesus Christ our Lord. So then with the mind I myself serve the law of God; but with the flesh the law of sin.

Eph 4:22-24 Put off concerning the former conversation the old man, which is corrupt according to the deceitful lusts; 23 And be renewed in the spirit of your mind; 24 And that ye put on the new man, which after God is created in righteousness and true holiness.

John 3:3-7 Jesus answered and said unto him, Verily, verily, I say unto thee, Except a man be born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God. 4 Nicodemus saith unto him, How can a man be born when he is old? can he enter the second time into his mother's womb, and be born? 5 Jesus answered, Verily, verily, I say unto thee, Except a man be born of water and of the Spirit, he cannot enter into the kingdom of God. 6 That which is born of the flesh is flesh; and that which is born of the Spirit is spirit. 7 Marvel not that I said unto thee, Ye must be born again.

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Rom 8:8,9,13 They that are in the flesh cannot please God, 9 but ye are not in the flesh, but in the spirit, if so be that the Spirit of God dwell in you. Now if any man have not the Spirit of Christ, he is none of his.

Gal 5:16-18 The flesh lusteth against the Spirit, and the spirit against the flesh; and these are contrary the one to the other: so that ye cannot do the things that ye would.



8. Gives us an opportunity to minister to others. I was able to comfort 2 of my Bible college students who lost children because we had 6 miscarriages ourselves. We lost our first on Mother's Day.
9. God's only Son was tortured to death. God knows what it's like to lose a child. Isa 53. “He was bruised for our iniquities.”
Heb 4.5 We have a high priest *[Jesus]* who can be touched with our pain.
10. We may have the opportunity to help others through the death of a child donate: eyes, hearts, kidneys, liver, blood, empathy, time
II Cor 1.4 “*[He]* comforts us. . .so we can comfort *[others].*”
11. Is God trying to build strength, thankfulness, empathy, or kindness into my life?
12. Some get extra grace because God allows, or sends trials II Cor 12.7,9 “My grace is sufficient for thee.”

14. Helps us to examine ourselves Psalm 119.71 Job 5.17 “happy is the man. . .”
15. Paul was in jail so many could trust Jesus as Savior, even though some Christians were glad. Phil 1.12 This happened “unto the furtherance of the Gospel.”
Phil 2.30 “for the work of the Lord *[Epaphroditus]* was nigh unto death.”
16. Prevents some kids from growing up in godless homes, or prevents them from getting into a life of crime. I Kings 14.13 One of Jeroboam's small children was spared growing up in a wicked family, because God allowed him to die young.
17. Thousands of people have become internally stronger because terrible things have happened. You probably know somebody who became kinder, stronger, more helpful, or more thankful because he/she went through tragedy, bankruptcy, illness, rejection, or deep sorrow.
18. Old age brings a hunger for Heaven. Just living in mortal bodies reminds us that there is something better which lasts for eternity. I Corinthians 5.1-7
19. Teach us to glory in our infirmities or “take pleasure in my infirmities” Godly people learn patience pretty quickly but it is another step up to take pleasure in through trouble and infirmities—when God chooses to give neither a reason nor a solution. Are we deeply thankful for it? God might choose never to relieve us—for His glory.



P. Myers, 5 dispensations


Each age brought greater depth of understanding of God's plan of salvation. Yet salvation was always on the basis of faith in the coming of One who would provide deliverance.





- * Don't denigrate your adversary. He is not our enemy. He is the victim of our enemy.
- * Remember, goodness trumps brains.
- * Some grasp after public praise for being the mouthpiece of God.




